DIRECTIONS

From I-95 North or South: Take the Broad Street/Pattison Avenue exit off I-95. If coming from I-95 Southbound, turn right onto Broad Street. If coming from I-95 Northbound, the exit puts you on Broad Street. Stay to the left because the road divides. Turn left at the 2nd traffic light, which is Pattison Avenue. At the next traffic light turn left on 20th Street into FDR Park. Once in the park, take the first left.

From Rte. 76 going East (Schuylkill Expressway): Get off at the Penrose Avenue/International Airport exit (left lane exit). Go to the end of the exit road. At the traffic light, turn left onto Penrose. At first stoplight, turn right onto Pattison Avenue. The park entrance is at 20th Street. Once in the park, take the first left.

From Rte. 76 going West and the Walt Whitman Bridge: Take exit 46 to 7th Street. Follow 7th to Pattison Avenue. Turn right on Pattison, pass Citizens Bank Park on your right, and cross Broad Street. At next light (20th Street) turn left into FDR Park. Once in the park, take the first left.

ABOUT OUR SPEAKERS

ULRICA SÖDERLIND

This year's keynote speaker is author, chef, and Swedish food historian, Dr. Ulrica Söderlind. Dr. Söderlind holds a Ph.D. from the University of Stockholm. She gained experience in the restaurant industry both in the Swedish merchant navy and in the so called "Nobel kitchen" at Stockholm City Hall, and has written five books on topics such as, the role of food in Swedish social history, and the culinary history of the Nobel Banquet.

SUSAN PLAISTED

Susan McLellan Plaisted is an independent researcher and proprietress of Heart to Hearth Cookery. With her primary interest in historic foodways, she has presented her research on experimental archaeology regarding the traditions of Lenape food. Susan was the Pennsylvania Humanities Commonwealth Speaker for Lenape Foodways from 2008 through 2011.

DAVID FURLOW

Founder of the Law Offices of David A. Furlow, P.C., David serves as the Executive Editor of the Texas Supreme Court Historical Society Journal. David served as a script-writer, consultant, and expert in the History Channel's documentary, Warrior Queen Boudicca. David has published and presented several historical and archaeological papers for societies and conferences nation wide.

PETER ROSE

Peter Rose came to the United States from the Netherlands in the 1960s and has worked as a researcher, author, and lecturer specializing in Dutch and Dutch-American culinary history. As a member of the Speakers in the Humanities program of the New York Council for the Humanities, she lectures on historic Dutch food ways. Peter is the author of numerous books with topics including seasonal and celebratory traditions of the Hudson Valley Dutch. Peter was the 2002 recipient of the Alice P. Kenney Award for her research and writing on Dutch food history.

RICHARD WAGNER

Rich Wagner attended the Siebel Institute of Technology in Chicago where he received a diploma in brewing technology and spent seven years working in Philadelphia's craft breweries. Rich spent a decade as an officer of District Philadelphia, Master Brewers Association of the Americas. He currently spends his time interpreting colonial brewing using replicas of seventeenth century equipment, and writing about Pennsylvania breweries and brewing techniques of antiquity.
